Enjoy the dramatic surroundings and wild fishing in Lochaber.

This is not a land of calm water and docile fish. Getting here as you pass through Glen Coe or Glen Mhor you will realise this place is special, untamed and with fish to match. For fishing with a sense of the untouched and the wild, Lochaber will reward you with superb fishing against a backdrop of the most dramatic scenery.



Inverie, is an excellent choice for salmon, sea trout and brown trout fishing. It is located on the north side of Loch Nevis and it is one of the most remote villages in Britain. As it isn't connected to the road network it isn't the kind of place that fills up with passing crowds. With a pub, a cafe, a choice of accommodation and a small shop it has everything you need to complete your fishing break. As well as a warm welcome and first class fishing this area is also known for wildlife with stags, eagles, otters and porpoises often spotted.



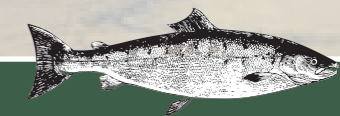
What will you catch?

Season

- Salmon and sea trout from 15 March to 16 October •
- Brown trout from 15 March to 6 October •

Remember

- 100% catch and release on salmon and sea trout •
- Bag limit of 3 trout per day applies on all fisheries •
- Fly-fishing only unless the river is in spate when spinning will be permitted •
- Barbless hooks on line and one branch of a treble to be removed if using tube flies or spinning •
- Strictly no live bait •
- Please collect & complete your Fishing Return Forms and hand them in to the Estate office before you leave •



Everything you need to know

Excellent value for money

- To fish on the river and loch is £35 per rod per day and to fish for brown trout only at the hill loch is £10 per day •
- Permits are available from the Kilchoan Estate Office •

Getting there

You cannot take your car to Inverie and most people come to Inverie as a foot passenger on the ferry from Mallaig harbour (the alternative is a very long, rough walk). The ferry takes around 30 minutes and during the summer months there are 8 ferries per day midweek and 4 trips per day at weekends.

As the ferry is the only regular link with Inverie, don't expect it to be your average visitor trip, you shouldn't be surprised if you are sharing the boat with shopping and supplies as much as locals and visitors.

Finding your way in Mallaig

The ticket office at Mallaig can be found near the slipway, here are the directions:

- On entering Mallaig turn right at the roundabout.
- Continue past the Co-op.
- Turn left just after the Fishmarket restaurant.
- Walk down to the harbour and you'll see the ticket office on your left.



Finding your way in Inverie

Once you are in Inverie it's a pleasant 30 minute walk to Kilchoan Estate, or a 5 minute drive (you would need to have arranged for someone in Inverie to pick you up in advance).

- As you leave the jetty head right onto the only tarmaced road.
- Follow this for about 1 mile until you see a sign to the bunkhouse on your left.
- Follow this track past the bunkhouse and over the river bridge.
- The estate is ahead to your right.

Your Guide To Inverie

1. Inverie Village: —

The ferry will land you in the village which has a pub, cafe and small shop with limited opening hours. There is also an information point. The sea pool is a 15-20 minute walk from the ferry.

2. Estate Office: —

Permits purchased here and catch return forms to be dropped off.

3. Cruive Pool: —

Below the weir the Cruive Pool is a good place to fish for salmon or sea trout.

4. Loch an Dubh-Lochain: —

The fishing is best 10-15m from the shoreline, especially where there are over-hanging trees on the bank. Another good place to try is where the loch flows in to the river, just in front of the dam.

5. Lower Monument Pool: —

This pool, just upstream of the bridge, is an excellent place to fish for salmon.

6. Loch Bhraomisaig: —

A 1.5hr walk will bring you to these hill lochs with amazing views and great trout fishing. The smaller of the two lochs has bigger fish but is best fished with the fly rather than a spinner due to the weed.

7. Sea Pool: —

Good fishing for sea trout here 1 hr either side of high tide.
